## Ambassador/Artist In Residence's Report

The year 2020 was a difficult time for Crossroad Arts. We had to keep our communication open via video conference and work from home for a few months because of COVID-19. Mat, Autumn, Georgia and I worked together on combining our ideas and skills during a film collaboration. We made a series of films together including the story of Cedric Black wood, the Lone Wanderer which you can view on our Vimeo account.

We also taught workshops for several community groups. My favourite was when we taught the Homeschool Group over 4 weeks. We helped the young children learn some basic performing skills and we created a show based on a storm theme. We shared some ideas about changing weather patterns we had experienced; flooding, storms, cyclones and rainbows after the rain. Together we performed a show for our friends and family.

My trip to Brisbane for the La Boite Theatre workshop was successful. I worked with Sarah Houbolt and I also taught the deafblind alphabet to the attendees. Sarah taught us about audio description which I found really interesting. I also took photographic portraits of the participants and we printed them through a thermal printer so that you could feel the raised images.

I also spoke on the Artour panel discussion which gave me the opportunity to explain about my work with Crossroad Arts and to share the potentials of assisting artists with disability in the community.

Every year we also create a piece for LOOSE ENDS. This year we looked at our heroes and love and our dreams. I played the role of Elvis Presley by telling the story of his life and how he had written some songs which were very

## Chair's Report

As the outgoing Chair of Crossroad Arts, it gives me great pleasure to provide this report for the period 2020/2021. The past twelve months have certainly been different with the entry of COVID impacting our communities and everything we do at all levels. The Arts Sector in general was significantly impacted and Crossroad Arts was unable to function and deliver its programs for a good part of the year. It certainly has been an interesting process to navigate what our new landscape looks like to ensure COVID social distancing compliance is applied in all of our activities and how we continue to successfully and meaningfully develop and deliver our programs in this new world.

Despite these challenges I am really pleased that Crossroad Arts was still able to forge ahead with some significant achievements. These included achieving four year funding from the Australia Council for the Arts, an additional twelve month's funding through the Tim Fairfax Foundation and a number of significant awards and recognitions for our Artistic Director/ CEO Alison Richardson, Artistic Associate Autumn Skuthorpe and our longstanding Ambassador Brendan Borellini. We are very proud of these wonderful accomplishments.

Probably one of our most important achievements has been the granting of a change of charity status of Public Benevolent Institution (PBI) by the Australian Charities and Not-for-Profits (ACNC). This change of status will provide significant benefits to the organisation through enhanced opportunities with our grants applications along with financial benefits to our staff. This piece of work has been ongoing for some years. It is important to recognise the pro bono support of Luke Furness and Alex Lebsanft from Clayton Utz who supported us through this substantial change. I would also like to recognise the guidance and support provided by our wonderful incoming Chair Brian Tucker, and the perseverance of our outgoing Treasurer Gavan Porter, who just refused to give up.

Due to the impacts of COVID, whilst our artistic programs have not been able to flourish it has been encouraging to see the creative ways that our Artistic Director/CEO Alison has managed to keep the organisation connected and engaged in our community. Our Artistic Associate Autumn Skuthorpe continues to be an integral member of our leadership team with sharing and directing the vision and goals of the organisation. It was wonderful to see our long serving Ambassador and Artist in Residence Brenden Borellini receive an Art and Culture Award at the recent

Mackay Regional Council
Australia Day awards. Through
the support of the Tim Fairfax
Foundation (TFFF) we are also
pleased to be retaining our Administrator
Lesa Walker who has really strengthened and enhanced our
administrative processes.

It is imperative to recognise the considerable and ongoing support of the Tim Fairfax Foundation (TFFF) over the past few years, in particular past Executive Officer Samantha Jorgensen. The support of the TFFF has been critical to strengthening the organisation including our governance processes and enhancing the capacity of the organisation at all levels. We are most grateful of this support.

As outgoing Chair I would like to take this opportunity to thank all of our Board members - Vice Chair David Conway, Secretary Traci Lietzke, Treasurer Gavan Porter, and Directors Mark Taylor, Tracey Heathwood, Patricia Ely and Brian Tucker for sharing their skills, knowledge and expertise. The time, efforts and commitment given by our Board members on a voluntary basis has been instrumental with successfully steering and leading the organisation into a very strong and solid position. Many thanks in particular to Gavan Porter, our outgoing Treasurer who has been pivotal in strengthening our governance with his oversight of our financial operations and activities. It has certainly been an interesting journey over these last three years as the Chair and following the retirement of our founding Artistic Director/CEO Steve Mayer- Miller and with Alison Richardson taking on this key and critical role. It will be exciting to see how the organisation continues to grow and evolve with our wonderful incoming Chair Brian Tucker at the helm.

The key element that I have enjoyed most with being involved with Crossroad Arts is the commitment by each and every person in the organisation to being an inclusive community driven organisation. ## Artistic Director/ CEO's Report

This was it! The year where we felt that the sheer hard work over the last two years fuelled by passion and determination was paying off and we were able to hit our stride! We felt organised, light and focussed and we were off to a flying start!

We weren't far into the year when we attended a fancy ceremony in Sydney where Autumn was recognised nationally for her commitment to inclusive community arts in Mackay by being awarded the Kirk Robson Award from the Australia Council for the Arts. Then after the ceremony Autumn jetted off for an exciting secondment at world renown inclusive arts theatre company, Back to Back Theatre in Geelong, Victoria. The good times were rolling!

In early March we successfully launched our 2020 Artistic Program and simultaneously our new accessible and central premises in the heart of Mackay! Unsanitised high fives, hugs and platters of finger food all round! What fun! (you see where this is heading...)

Then two weeks after our launch we had to shut our doors. We postponed our programs and productions indefinitely as we headed into lockdown and the unknown.

It was at our launch that I asked our audience to write a

word on a magnetic strip about how they were feeling that evening, what Crossroad Arts meant to them and/ or what they hope for Crossroad Arts' future. Each magnet was then placed on our outdoor blackboard to create the following group poem:

This will enable us to grow knowing that we have a somewhat stable base to continue to build upon.

Thank you also to our exceptional staff; Autumn, Lesa, Brenden and Mat for their ability to adapt and continue to create original new work and complete some large administrative tasks under strange and unsettling

circumstances. We say a huge thank you and a fond farewell to Mat Bing for his phenomenal work and dedication to Crossroad Arts over the last four years, he will be sorely missed as he takes up further opportunities in Brisbane. Thank you also to our Workshop Facilitator, Julieanne Bergmann and our Sponsorship / Development Officer, Joel Bow who despite a 'pause' in the middle of the year lent their expertise to enable the growth and development of our participants in our weekly workshop program and also the organisation through the coordination of two boutique fundraisers.

Thank you also to our Board for their flexibility and understanding and also for assisting in achieving Public Benevolent Institution status for the organisation. A particular thank you to our Chair, Marie Cameron and Treasurer Gavan Porter for their time on the Board as they step down from their roles 2021. Both gave selfishlessly of their time, particularly when there were many challenges and obstacles to navigate to ensure that Crossroad Arts could flourish as a nationally leading contemporary inclusive arts organisation in Mackay.

The poem we created together on a muggy night in March 2020, on an evening before the world changed forever was a small creative expression of a collective hope and positivity that we put out into our corner of the world on Wood St Mackay. May these words remind us and guide us as we unite, gather and connect together as humans through inclusive art making experiences for all.

2020! What a strange year! We were witness to seismic shifts across the globe. We had to adjust to mammoth changes to the way we connected, communicated and collaborated.

We had to pause. And then we had to navigate the strangeness together/apart.

Everyone has a COVID-19 story. I was away on my secondment at Back to Back in Geelong and upon hearing the State of Emergency announcement I rushed to catch a flight back to Queensland before the initial lockdown.

At Crossroad Arts I am used to a warm and buzzing workshop room, hugs with friends and colleagues when greeting, dancing in close contact during our C.R.U.S.H weekend intensives, signing hand to hand with Brenden, sharing cheese boards at Board meetings...and then in March my colleagues and I were peering at each other through tiny squares on a computer screen.

Brenden Borellini, Georgia Cranko, Alison Richardson, Mathew Bing and I began meeting weekly on Facebook messenger. We would chat across two devices so Brenden could read our conversations through text and we could see each other's faces. We began collaborating on the creation of short films. We expanded on Brenden and Georgia's previous creative development Breathe In. Using poetry, music and our phones/cameras we began exploring the themes of discomfort and unconscious bias when it comes to difference. We set out to create these films from each corner of our world.

We took turns to film, edit, create soundtracks, write poetry, audio describe and caption them. I really looked forward to these weekly online collaborative sessions. I felt useful again as an artist collaborating with other artists, despite being so far away I could connect with others and it gave me a break from the constant news announcements of how the pandemic was unfolding.

In Mackay, Queensland we were very fortunate that we could return to delivering our programs face to face in June. Our weekly Workshop Program was filled with laughter, friendship and socially distant air high fives!

Collaborating and practicing art during this time reinforced to me how important it is for us as a society to ensure that artists are supported and nurtured into the future, into this new normal.

We already know that creativity allows us to transmute complex experiences, translate stories into a universal language and create safe spaces for us to explore our differences. So many of us relied on the arts to get us through the lockdown.

Our attendance and participation rates increased as people were eager to come to an event or enrol in our Workshop Program. LOOSE ENDS sold out quickly. We grew our supporter base with the business community; people wanted to celebrate the arts, access and inclusion. People longed for a sense of community and togetherness after all of the disruption.



Whilst the way we could gather ebbed and flowed daily - we figured out ways to celebrate community in these new times. We created safe ways to feel connected.

As artists we are used to adapting and responding to change. Many artists with disability during the lockdown spoke of the access that was embraced as norm to accommodate a pause in the world; flexible working arrangements, Auslan interpreters, captions and audio description provided as a given during online offerings. Artists with disability also shared their lived experience and knowledge of how to manage isolation. Once again artists with limited resources have had to find a way to survive. We should recognise our creatives as innovators and problem solvers - and support them accordingly. Because when the world stopped we looked to music, film, art, books, creative ways of connecting. And in 2021 with things still up in the air it will be artists and innovators who guide us.

## Artist In Residence

Long-time Crossroad Arts performer and photographer, Brenden Borellini, was employed as an artist one day per week where he worked alongside an Artist Support on creative projects taking place throughout the year. As an artist who is deafblind Brenden brings a unique perspective to his work and a voice that is often not heard.

#### Advocacy and speaking engagements:

Brenden represented Crossroad Arts both online and in person through a series of events throughout 2021. Brenden advocated for increased access for artists with disability and raised the profile of regional inclusive arts practice by speaking at Crossroad Arts boutique fundraising events Let's Dine Darling and Hi! Morning Tea, presenting access initiatives during an Artour Panel discussion. Brenden's artwork was also featured in the Queensland Writers Centre quarterly journal WQ with 1,800 copies distributed across the state. Brenden was awarded the National Disability Leadership Institute winner for Arts and Culture for his continued commitment to raise the profile of regional artists with disability who face barriers due to their geographical isolation and his advocacy around inclusion in the arts more widely.

#### **Community Development:**

Brenden co-facilitated workshop programs for young people from Mackay Homeschool Group, CREATE Foundation and Phoenix Place in performance making. These workshops connected a cross section of the community and introduced new participants who had not engaged with Crossroad Arts previously.

Brenden also enjoyed his role as a co-facilitator and delivered warm up workshops as part of the C.R.U.S.H weekend alongside colleagues Natasha Tomlinson and Alison Richardson.

As part of LOOSE ENDS Brenden devised a new work alongside other long time Crossroad Arts performers and performed at the major fundraiser of the year LOOSE ENDS in December which coincided with International Day for People with Disability.

#### **Artistic Development:**

As a result of COVID-19 Brenden, artist and acclaimed poet Georgia Cranko (Sydney) began collaborating online and extending on their previous creative development Breathe In. The collaboration culminated in a series of short films that aimed to embed accessibility in a creative way. The films explore poetry, music and the themes of otherness, unconscious bias and proximity.

Brenden exhibited a selection of his tactile works as part of the Art from the Margins exhibition in Brisbane in October. This exhibition featured a series of works from artists from across Queensland who happened to be blind or low vision.

Alongside Sarah Houbolt, Brenden was invited to deliver a thermal photographic masterclass held at La Boite Theatre Company called 'Sensing the Theatrical'. The workshop considered audio description in a creative and accessible context. Brenden was able to raise the profile of Crossroad Arts programs and connect with other organisations and artists with disability from across the state.

# Community Development

## Workshop Program

Throughout the program students developed new skills, friends and supported each other as a group. For many it was an opportunity to grow confidence in performing in front of a group for the first time, adapting to significant change, collaborating with people with diverse access requirements in a social setting and expressing themselves through performance making. The workshops were suitable for those 18yrs + with and without disability. We had to postpone workshops in Term 2 due to the lockdown, however when we were able to return to activity we noticed a significant increase in participation.

#### Overall outcomes of Workshop Program:

- Increased engagement and return enrolment from new participants
- Creation of programs for a diverse range of ages
- Increased confidence, social skills and improvisation/collaboration skills
- Employment of two artists with disability as co-facilitators.
- Referrals from support workers and service providers to potential participants outside of our networks.
- Community connections and outreach beyond our current supporters.

These weekly dance and movement workshops led by local contemporary dancer Julieanne Bergmann were designed for those wanting to learn new skills in dance and movement.

Through Julieanne's guidance the participants were welcomed to explore contemporary movement making skills centred on communication and choice. Participants explored choreographic skills including scale, pace, orientation, accumulation, transposition, spacial relationship, cue sequencing and sampling. Emotion and gesture were used to stimulate these actions.

Observation was encouraged throughout the eight weeks and participants were frequently invited to share what they observed. This gave other participants an insight into how their movements were perceived by others and the power of movement to transmit unique ideas and tell stories.

Stretchy Pants proved to be a popular class and in 2021 an additional class will be included in programming.

Crossroad Arts received over 180 submissions for 10,080 Minutes as part of a community project that aimed to engage people from the community in a fun and safe way post COVID-19 disruption.

Crossroad Arts wanted to capture the spirit, feelings & experiences of people during a week in lockdown and called for photographic and video submissions from the community. These submissions resulted in the creation of a short film called 10,080 Minutes which was the amount of minutes during the lockdown week submissions were chosen from.

What a fantastic night celebrating the opening of the latest exhibition 10,080 Minutes. Over 70 people contributed to this including me, and to see it on the screen is brilliant!

The aim of these school holiday workshops was to still provide opportunities for the 15 years plus age group as our weekly workshops were now designed for participants 18 years and older.

The program's content was framed by deep diving into the significant themes of metamorphosis and hybrid creatures in the Curious Affection exhibit and in particular responding to the "Teenage Metamorphosis" work. These themes were explored through movement, drama and performance making. For many this was their first time visiting Artspace and participating in a Crossroad Arts program.

C.R.U.S.H was an open, inclusive, accepting and playful experience for all where everyone felt creatively nourished and included. We look forward to being able to expand the program to once again include artists and participants nationwide in 2021.
