

Company History

Throughout Crossroad Arts' proud 27 year strong history, the company has established itself as a leader in inclusive arts practice in Queensland.

Our mission is to provide access to creative expression through inclusive arts programs and practice to achieve our vision of 'arts for all.' We achieve this through the delivery of highly visible & innovative multi arts programs that capture and promote the essence of our regional voice.

We work with communities to celebrate diversity and culture. We ensure the challenges and ambitions of the community are central to the narratives being shared and developed with a specific focus on those with disability.

We create access points for unique partnerships with art and non-art organisations locally, in remote and regional western Queensland communities and across the Asia Pacific region.

We push beyond boundaries of social isolation, discrimination and inequity to contribute and cultivate the sector to create a sense of inclusiveness that celebrates art as a force of intrinsic good and a key ingredient for a better and more vibrant society.



Acknowledgement of Country:

Crossroad Arts acknowledges and pays respect to the past, present and future Traditional Custodians and Elders of Australia. We deeply respect the Traditional peoples ongoing connection to Country and the continuation of cultural, spiritual and educational practices of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples. Our core Artistic Program falls under three pillars:

1. Artistic Development:

we deliver programs that are designed to ensure people grow as artists through rigorous, skills-based training in collaboration with professional local, national and international artists.

2. Community Development:

community is our driving force. Our work is underpinned by the belief that creating artistic works that challenge assumptions through inclusive collaboration ultimately builds stronger communities.

3. Outreach:

our Outreach Program is committed to working with regional and remote Queensland communities giving access to arts and cultural experiences.

Ambassador/Artist In Residence's Report

Hello everyone. It is Brenden Borellini here. 2023 was a big year full of challenges and also some amazing shows and work. I continued my work here at Crossroad Arts as the Artist in Residence and Ambassador with my weekly work. I would say Crossroad Arts is a small regional company in Mackay which puts on amazing performances for other artists with disability to share their stories. I think we make the best performances like the show for 2023 Breathe In and I am also thinking about the other shows we have done previously like An Unexpected Tour, Cry of the Curlew and even one of my first Crossroad Arts shows Whiff!

It was wonderful to finally be able to share with the world our show Breathe In - that was the biggest moment for me and I was really proud of our work.

I had been working with my friend Georgia Cranko on the Breathe In story for many years. We both use different ways to communicate including using hand signing and AAC devices; I use a braille device. Georgia uses a text to speech device. We take our time, we slow down and we also need to feel the space and listen to each other.

I found it a bit hard sometimes to tell people my story - because we have both had some difficult and dangerous times when people don't listen to us. For me it was a bad experience with a taxi and how I was left stranded alone on the street and no one could communicate with me. I felt like I was standing in a dark, alien world. Until....

My favourite moment with Georgia was our way of finding each other in an unknown world by walking through the

places and meeting up to get our bearings by signing to each other without any sound or vision such as touching each other and seeing where we are.

I have worked at Crossroad Arts for more than 10 years and I have done projects in photography, performing, poetry, movement and teaching. My work is the best I can be - it is my professional work and I love all of the people I have met and all of the people I have made theatre shows with.

I couldn't guess how many people I have worked with since I have started at Crossroad Arts but my favourite memory of Crossroad Arts is supporting people with disability to learn new skills and showing them how I can perform in shows. That is my favourite.

I think Crossroad Arts should continue to function by putting on future performances and helping other communities learn new skills in storytelling and staging thematic shows based on their own ideas

I think most funders should know that Crossroad Arts is a small regional company who supports our community and also makes opportunities for us to show the audience how important artists with disability are and what we bring to the stage and to the world.

Chair's Report

For those of a certain vintage there was a television series Number 96 involving the activities of the tenants in a block of flats in Sydney. A few years ago I flew to Sydney to attend the opening of an exhibition of works by a client and friend, the exhibition being held at the Number 96 location which was by then an art gallery. The show was a huge success and I chatted to the artist:

Mate, I've got some good news and some bad news.

Oh no! You're going to tell me I'm going to have to start paying tax! (artists are unused to paying tax)

No, that would actually be good news, because if this goes on you'll be earning enough to have to pay tax, but also manage to save up for a deposit on a house.

Right, so what's the bad news?


This is probably the last work of yours that I'll be able to afford! (I had bought one piece and been offered 50% more than the sticker price by another attendee; my motto "There's the quick and there's the missed-out")

Anyway, the good news is that Crossroad Arts has again presented a year of programs, performances and activities that establishes itself as not just "...a leader in inclusive arts

practice in Queensland" but in Australia. We have presented at the Undercover Artist Festival, supported artists from regional Australia to enable them to attend the C.R.U.S.H workshop weekend, enriched the lives of more local and near-local artists, broadened local community awareness of our programs, exceeded our Annual Giving targets and, to sold-out audiences, presented three nights of Breathe In.

Now, in the context of Mackay, a "sold-out" venue is an audience of 95! And therein lies the rub:

Crossroad Arts is based in Mackay and serves a regional community (not Sydney, Melbourne or Brisbane, where "sold-out" could be upwards of a thousand); we presently have a full-time staff of 1.8, the rest casual (not 10 or 20); our shows don't get reviewed in the Sydney Morning Herald, the Australian or The Age; we don't have tens of thousands of dollars for production development, not to mention the travel, accommodation and living costs associated with regional Australia. And yet, despite all that, Crossroad Arts brought you Breathe In. A production devised and created by Brenden Borellini in Mackay and Georgia Cranko in Melbourne. Both performers use alternative communication. I saw the video production at Queensland Theatre in Brisbane and left overwhelmed with emotions. One would



have been equally impressed had it come from a major performing arts company in any of the capital cities but, again, the rub: the majors couldn't, wouldn't have pulled this off. It took a tiny company in regional Queensland to bring this to the stage.

As I write, Breathe In has been nominated for five...five!! Matilda Awards.

The bad news? Despite initial glowing comments on our Expression of Interest for Creative Australia multi-year funding, we were unsuccessful in proceeding further. We might have ticked the box marked Disability, we might have ticked the one marked Regional, we might have ticked many others but, along with many other worthwhile applicants, we reached the end of that road. That might lead me to make further comments on the poor state of arts funding in Australia (submarines? sporting stadia? heck, anything sporting related). But I'll refrain as my views are well known.

So we are in a challenging environment, that's for sure. We need to find sources of revenue to replace our lost Creative Australia funding, while reassuring our current funders including Arts Queensland and the Tim Fairfax Family Foundation, both of whom we thank unreservedly, that we've dusted ourselves off, picked ourselves up, and

are forging ahead. Our next major challenge is to present ourselves as a truly disability-led organisation, as embodied in our current Strategic Plan.

But back to good news. Well, perhaps some not-so-good news first: during the year we farewelled Alison Richardson, CEO and Artistic Director, who has left to return to Sydney for family reasons. We thank her for all she has done for the Company over the last six years, and her send-off in Mackay a few months back was a sad affair, but she goes with our love and best wishes. Autumn has taken on the Artistic Director position and is also acting in the role of CEO; we had started a recruitment process for a CEO with disability but that had to be paused following the notification of the loss of Creative Australia funding. It is still very much on our agenda, although our members, including Vice-Chair Dave Conway and Ambassador Brenden Borellini are emphatic in affirming the opinion powerfully articulated by our Treasurer, Felicity Chapman: we are already disability-led, but led from the bottom up, not top down.


And more positivity? We have the best team anyone could wish for; from Autumn who took on so much more than we should have expected, to Lesa Walker (Company Administrator), Melissa Broadhurst (Sponsorship and Development Officer) and Annalise Mawer (Workshop Facilitator and Marketing Officer) and all those who run the workshops and activities, I thank and love you all.

We have to express our deepest and unreserved thanks to our principal funding partners: Arts Queensland, Tim and Gina Fairfax and all at the Tim Fairfax Family Foundation, and Creative Australia. Also on our 'shout out' list are those in the local community who recognise, validate and support us, financially and otherwise including the Mackay Regional Council, Mackay Entertainment and Convention Centre, Artspace Mackay and many others including Daly Bay, Principal Sponsor of the Artistic Program, BOLD Architecture, Renew Mackay, Ergon Energy and Payne Print.

To my fellow Board members; Vice-Chair Dave Conway, Treasurer Felicity Chapman, Secretary Lauren Turton, along with Patricia Ely, Tracey Heathwood and Mark Taylor and, until their resignation, Traci Lietzke and Jennifer Emmett, thank you for your unfailing support, wisdom and generosity during what has been a roller-coaster year. And to all those who participated in our workshops, performances and activities: you are the reason for our being.

Artistic Director/ CEO's Report

January - October

Over the last 6 years, I have had the absolute pleasure of leading Crossroad Arts as the Artistic Director/ CEO, a position I never took for granted.

During my time at Crossroad Arts, it has been extremely rewarding to see the significant growth, renewal and reinvigoration of the strategic direction of the company. As a team we have also been able to establish a stable infrastructure, a rebrand of the company and a move to a central, visible and accessible premises all the while creating new and original performance and art. With thanks to our supportive funders in particular the Tim Fairfax Family Foundation (TFFF), we have also been able to maintain and also increase our staff capacity so that we can deliver our annual Artistic Program in a healthy and sustainable way.

Importantly, it has been heartening to see the groundswell of community engagement and the droves of people attending our weekly workshop program, performances and events as audiences members and participants. It has been rewarding to hear their often surprised feedback when they are presented with an original artwork be it a film, performance, art piece or have participated in a workshop that their once held assumptions about what people with disability are capable of achieving has significantly shifted. It has been satisfying and a joy to witness the transformative effect our artmaking can have with our production of *Breathe In* this year being no exception!

I am grateful to the community of good people that surround Crossroad Arts that are now extra mouthpieces in the community championing Inclusive Arts and equality more broadly. This could not have been possible without the support of federal arts funding body Creative Australia, state funders Arts QLD and the aforementioned TFFF who have all recognised and backed the vital and necessary work of Crossroad Arts. This security of three lots of multi-year funding has never been taken for granted. It has meant that we have been able to enjoy a steady growth, build our community, tell our stories and create our performances and art with a level of certainty that our doors will be open and that we will be able to achieve long term impact with lasting benefits and outcomes for our community, not just in Mackay but across the country.

I'd also like to extend my sincere thanks to the local sponsors and donors, from the gyms to the real estate agents who also recognise how important a company like Crossroad Arts is for their community. This is when the Mackay community is at its finest, happy and willing to pitch in to support when it's needed.

Thank you to our artists, performers, facilitators, volunteers, our support workers, participants, parents, audiences and supporters whose contribution has shaped Crossroad Arts into a place that we can all be extremely proud of. I have valued everyone's input and the part you have played in addressing gaps in opportunity and assisting us achieve not only our company vision but our vision for a more inclusive society at large.

A personal thank you to the exceptional staff; Brenden Borellini, Autumn Skuthorpe, Lesa Walker, Annalise Mawer and Melissa Broadhurst for their commitment to the vision and values of Crossroad Arts and their active work ethic to enact change. I look forward to seeing the direction the company takes under the very capable leadership of Autumn who has stepped into the role of Artistic Director/ CEO. I wish her and the whole team, Board and community the very best in continuing to champion equality through the arts.

Artistic Associate's Report

Artistic Associate January - October Artistic Director/CEO October - present

Crossroad Arts is many things to our community. I asked some of our performers and artists recently and they said:

Crossroad Arts is a meeting place for artists...

It is a place that makes our town proud...

It is a noisy room full of laughter before a workshop...

It is where I see all of my friends...

It is a place to be paid as an artist...

It is a place to tell our stories the way we want to...

It is a place where we build our own stages...

Our work trickles out across the community in ways that sometimes we are unable to measure. For the last 26 years Crossroad Arts has been making contemporary and original theatre from and within our region. We will often hear from someone who was in a workshop ten years ago or worked on a project way back when Crossroad Arts was on Shakespeare St...and it is so heartening to hear their memories and also what they are doing now with their creative practice.

We have celebrated so many stories and we are proud to create our art from a regional perspective.

And we do this through our work:

Our workshop programs that continue to grow and build

capacity of future performers, our professional development and training performance making intensive weekend C.R.U.S.H, our major theatre works developed each year, our exhibition opportunities and our community events.

A 2023 highlight for me was seeing *Breathe In* take Mackay audiences by surprise. *Breathe In* has since been nominated for 5 Matilda Awards and we are enormously proud as a regional theatre company to see our work recognised. But just as important was our behind the scenes work supporting artists in their independent practice to strengthen the Mackay arts sector and to ensure it represents all artists in our community through informal mentorships, grant writing support, access to resources and artist support. We pack a lot in a year with a small but mighty team and we are always energised by the generosity of our artists and their trust to share their artmaking with us.

2023 also came with change. Our team and all of our artists thank Alison Richardson for her artistic leadership and advocacy during her time at Crossroad Arts as Artistic Director/CEO. I first met Alison above the old Parish Hall in 2017. It was exciting to welcome a new Artistic Director/CEO and to see what was in store for us as we headed into a new chapter. We shared many big moments! We packed up 20 years of Crossroad Arts history into a truck, moved buildings, teased out big strategic plan documents and kicked off new Artistic Programs. We had volunteers come out and help us

Artist In Residence

As an artist who is deafblind Brenden brings a unique perspective to his work and a voice that is often not heard. Brenden believes that it is very important for artists with disability to have access to opportunities that develop their artistic works to showcase their stories to the whole world.

Breathe In

PERFORMANCE

After four years of creative development and many challenges Crossroad Arts presented Breathe In as part of the Mackay Festival of Arts.

Breathe In was a hauntingly poetic performance piece that explored an alienating, alternate world of existence and the fragile line between connection and isolation.

Audiences entered through Paxton's Warehouse doors and were taken into a world filled with live music, poetry and projection as lead performers Georgia Cranko (VIC) and Brenden Borellini (QLD) gave a captivating and also disturbing insight into how they as people who use alternate communication survive in a world that can be at times frightening, unrelenting and inaccessible.

Key performer Georgia Cranko reflected:

"Breathe In is a culmination of experiences and stories we have collected; and then recounted with humour, grief, and joy usually at the pub, over a beer. Most of these stories are from the actual creative process itself.

What we have ended up with is a feat of resilience, determination, and care. Over the four years, these themes kept coming up, not only in the material we were generating, but also in the way our team worked together. With absolute support, patience, and trust, we have faced challenge after challenge, disruption after disruption, in devising this work.

Despite the numerous misadventures, a solid belief in the power of vulnerability, communication, and connection is what has continually driven us forward, (along with the persistence of Crossroad Arts).

COVID really brought this into stark focus. The whole world began experiencing some of what people without the luxury of speech wrestle with daily - the social isolation, the uncertainty and fear, and the frustrations of technology in connecting to others. It emphasised the real importance and the universality of the content that Breathe In explores.

It is a privilege to be on this creative journey with such a talented and devoted team, but especially with Brenden. He challenges me to listen more deeply, understand the differences in our experiences, and then find comfort in the knowledge I am not alone in a world that does not value my voice."

Breathe In has since been nominated for 5 Matilda Awards. Nominations include Best Mainstage, Best Sound or Composition Design, Best Video Design, Best Direction and The Lord Mayor's Award for best new Australian Work. Crossroad Arts is thrilled to be nominated and proud that our work from the regions is being acknowledged alongside our peers.

Workshop Program

Throughout the 2023 Workshop Program performers developed new skills and made new friends. For many it was an opportunity to grow confidence in performance making and storytelling and to continue collaborating with others. The workshops were suitable for those 18yrs + with and without disability and most participants returned from 2022 programs. It was also great to welcome new people and to see them continue throughout the whole year or to watch participants get involved in larger performances outside of the Workshop Program as they felt confident to extend themselves as a performer.

In 2023 we were able to offer an additional Stretchy Pants workshop due to demand.

The Workshop Program continues to be an integral part of training and development for participants who are interested in exploring creative practice in a fun and relaxed environment.

Overall outcomes of Workshop Program:

- Increased engagement and return enrolment from new participants
- · Creation of new programs for a diverse range of ages
- Increased confidence, social skills and improvisation/ collaboration skills
- Employment of 6 facilitators
- Referrals from support workers and service providers to potential participants outside of our networks.
- Community connections and outreach beyond our current supporters.
- Expansion of the program to meet interest from the community.



Performance in the Gallery

Drama workshops for everyone!

In this exciting partnership with Artspace Mackay, participants with and without disability were invited to respond through drama, movement and music to the current exhibitions.

Participants learnt new skills, built confidence and made new friends in a safe, fun and inclusive environment! Workshops were suitable for those 18yrs + with and without disability.

We enjoyed deepening our understanding of the different exhibitions at Artspace and using visual arts as a stimulus for our storytelling. Highlights for all of the participants were our gallery visits where we could examine up close and personal the themes of the exhibitions.

Participants enjoyed discovering the work and learning about the political landscapes of Davida Allen, uncovering local stories from the Fire and Ash exhibit of Carol and Arthur Rosser, zoning in on uncomfortable truths with Zanny Begg's films and diving into the energetic and colourful works of local artist Stephen Homewood. Every year our participants look forward to looking through the layers of the different exhibitions. A huge thank you to Artspace and their staff for always ensuring that our participants have an engaging experience at the gallery.

C.R.U.S.H continues to have a national focus to promote professional development opportunities for artists with disability and to also promote the region as an inclusive arts destination. As always C.R.U.S.H was tailored to suit all ages, bodies, minds and levels of artistic experience - from raw beginner to highly accomplished performers, and/or dancers.

2023 was the fifth year of C.R.U.S.H and was a full 3 days of storytelling, movement and collaboration. Under the guidance of experienced facilitators Jordan Galliot and Madaleine Armstrong (Dancenorth), Maddy Lewis (La Boite Theatre Company), Josh Notting (Swoonsound) and our Ambassador/Assistant Facilitator, Charlee Presland as well as local artists Joshua Clarke and Margret Ross, participants learnt skills in theatre making, storytelling, movement and dance and also tie-dyeing. A sharing of what was learnt and created in the workshops was presented in a casual showing in front of family and friends on the final day.

Additionally, participants also visited our premier gallery, Artspace Mackay to explore and gain inspiration from Mackay artist Stephen Homewood's exhibition Turbulence. They also had the opportunity to listen to the Artistic Director Tracey Heathwood deliver an artist talk and answer any questions.

We were thrilled to have new participants hailing from all parts of the country in attendance making a total of 45 participants plus their supports. The feedback was overwhelmingly positive from everyone and they are all keen to return next year. Many people placed equal weight on meeting new people and



coming to a new place/ town/ state just as important as the creative skills they were learning.

Crossroad Arts was able to fund 13 scholarships (to cover travel and accommodation) for artists with disability from regional towns across Queensland, New South Wales, Victoria, South Australia and Tasmania to attend. Often regional artists find it expensive or difficult to travel to professional development opportunities so Crossroad Arts hopes to continue to offer scholarships in the future.

HeART (Beats) Exhibition

Our HeART(beats) Access is Love project aimed to help build a world where accessibility is understood as an act of love, instead of a burden or an after-thought.

It was an initiative to raise awareness about accessibility and encourage people to incorporate access in their everyday practices and lives and was initially launched as part of the Disability Intersectionality Summit, 2018. HeART(beats) aimed to help build a world where accessibility is understood as an act of love, instead of a burden or an after-thought. We invited all community members to respond to the theme Access is Love by creating an original artwork using any medium and in any style

Participants donated the artwork and it was exhibited and sold as part of an additional fundraising campaign.

Crossroad Arts received 184 artworks from participants across Australia including regional Queensland and New South Wales.

The artworks were also projected onto our Window Gallery during the exhibition dates.

Street View Gallery featured seven artists to have their work exhibited for a month on our office walls in the heart of Mackay!

This opportunity was opened to emerging, mid-career and established artists with disability from the Mackay/Whitsunday/Isaac region. Artists with mental health conditions or who are neurodiverse and for those who are First Nations or LGBTIQA+ were encouraged to apply.

Street View Gallery is an opportunity to exhibit artwork in a supported environment. Crossroad Arts also happens to be located in a high traffic part of the Mackay CBD and many artists sold work as a result. Artists have organised their own exhibitions or collaborations since their involvement with the Street View Gallery which is an excellent outcome.

The exhibition opened as part of the Mackay Waterfront Development City Heart Fridays and included projections of the artworks on our Window Gallery nightly for a month.

In 2024 Artspace Mackay will deepen the Street View Gallery project by offering curatorial professional development and Crossroad Arts will invite key artists to learn how to run the project themselves. The intention is to hand Street View Gallery over to the artists and offer opportunities to build skills and experience to develop their capacity as creatives. In 2024 we hope to uncover more artists who might be interested in exhibiting and connecting.
